
Better Health Partnership Envisioning the Future







FUSION OF INNOVATION

Association Of A Regional Health Improvement Collaborative With Ambulatory Care-Sensitive Hospitalizations

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ABSTRACT Although regional health improvement collaboratives have been adopted nationwide to improve primary care quality, their effects on avoidable hospitalizations and costs remain unclear. We quantified the association of the Better Health Partnership, a primary care-led regional health improvement collaborative operating in Cuyahoga County, Ohio (Cleveland and surrounding suburbs), with hospitalization rates for ambulatory care-sensitive conditions. The partnership uses a positive deviance approach to identify, disseminate publicly, and accelerate adoption of best practices for care of patients with diabetes, heart failure, and hypertension. Using a difference-in-differences approach, we compared rates of hospitalizations for ambulatory care-sensitive conditions in six Ohio counties before (2003-08) and after (2009-14) the establishment of the partnership. Age- and sex-adjusted hospitalization rates for targeted ambulatory care-sensitive conditions in Cuyahoga County declined significantly more than the rates in the comparator counties in 2009-11 (106 fewer hospitalizations per 100,000 adult residents) and 2012-14 (91 fewer hospitalizations). We estimated that 5,746 hospitalizations for ambulatory care-sensitive conditions were averted in 2009-14, leading to cost savings of nearly \$40 million

FQHC Collaboration – COVID 19 Response

Local Community Health Centers:

- Collectively provided 33,000 vaccines in 2021 to individuals disproportionately impacted by COVID-19 related hospitalizations and deaths
- Partnered with public health, hospitals, faith-based organizations and health insurance payers
- Used data to identify hot spots and share best practices for outreach and engagement of the community with testing, vaccinations

Social Drivers of Health: Care Coordination

Better Health Pathways HUB- established 2020

- ~ 3,500 people* served by 40+ CHWs; (2020- Q3 2024)
- ~ 85% of babies delivered are healthy birth weight (2023)
- High adult wellness visit rates; reduction in ED visits (2023)
- ~ 80% successful completion of social need referrals (2020- Q3 2024)



Current Hypertension Prevalence: Cuyahoga County





Why Cleveland Heights

- Why don't you take your child for well care?




Well child visits are critical Checkins on our children. It's important we as parents and community can assess how our children ar growing and teveloping!



Community Residents helped Co-design Strategies to Improve Access to Well Care *

- Leverage Community Health Workers (CHWs) continue care coordination with babies born to their pregnant clients.
- Engage school-based professionals to refer to CHWs or directly to primary care with children experiencing school transitions
- Connect primary care providers with **faith-based community** to assist with outreach and engagement of families in well care
- Food banks to refer to CHWs or directly to primary care when families access food pantries


